How to do a Close Reading (or Annotation)

Close Reading is purposefully reading a text several times in order to analyze and gain a deep understanding of the information.

- 1)1st Reading: Kev Ideas and Details = "Scraping the surface"
- -READ THROUGH, AND CONSIDER THE OVERALL KEY MESSAGE
- connect to background knowledge (what do you already know about this)?
- focus on key ideas (just get an overall impression)
- 2) 2nd Reading: Craft and Structure= "Digging deeper"
- -READ THROUGH, AND BREAK IT DOWN, FOCUSING ON TEXT FEATURES LIKE:
- organizational patterns like where the beginning/middle/end are, or how the lines are broken up, or how the author uses punctuation or repetition
- · vocabulary- define unknown words using context clues or a dictionary,
- what figurative language is used (How is the author manipulating you as a reader- what images pop up in your imagination)?
- 3) **3rd Reading**: *Integration of Knowledge and Ideas*= "Processing the treasure"
- -FINAL READING SHOULD BE MORE MEANINGFUL NOW THAT YOU'VE DONE ALL THAT ANALYSIS WORK. THIS TIME, SYNTHESIZE THE INFORMATION (BRING IT ALL TOGETHER) AND REFLECT ON WHAT IT MEANS TO YOU.
- think about what the author's point really is
- consider how the information relates to your life,
- summarize the key idea and supporting points

SOME THINGS YOU MIGHT BE ASKED TO DO AT THIS POINT:

- · compare it to other texts you've already read, using a graphic organizer
- record your thinking in notes/graphic organizer/post-it notes etc.
- write a response or mimic the style of the author in your own work

WHEN I ASK YOU TO DO A CLOSE READING, HERE'S WHAT I EXPECT TO SEE...

- Highlight//underline: Examples (points that support the Key Idea)
- ☑ Highlight/underline= Data/Evidence (like important dates, names, numbers, places)
- Mark any noticeable patterns, repetition, rhyme, figurative language
- ☑CIRCLE & FIND DEFINITIONS FOR= Vocabulary (Write definitions in the margins)!
- ■ASK QUESTIONS! (Write them in the margins)!
- MAKE CONNECTIONS! (Write them in the margins)! Do you agree/disagree? Make notes!
